Spelling, Punctuation & Grammar	<p>SPAG Mat 2 – Complete this week.</p> <p>Word of the day – <b>were</b> (we were, they were <b>not</b> the place where). (Please write 8 times in your spelling book). Spell each of these words once in your spelling book – <b>use, used, before, door, floor, poor, asked, people, water, where, gone, eyes, lady, ladies, law, lawn, ice-cream, ginger, write, knock, gnome, little, badge, badger.</b> Parents – Please put all words into a short sentence when asking your child to spell them. Thank you.</p> <p><b>Phonics</b> Re-watch the Espresso video to see how to spell words ending in ‘<b>dge</b>’. (See the blog). <b>Remember</b> we only use the ‘dge’ spelling at the end of words and it usually follows a short vowel sound E.g. hedge. Print off the ‘<b>Words ending in dge spelling</b>’ activity sheet (See the blog). Read the sentences and choose the correct word to add to the sentence so it makes sense. Read the dge words first and discuss with a grown up any words you are unsure of the meaning. If you can’t print off the sheet, then copy the sentences into your pink book and leave a space so you can add the missing word.</p> <p><b>Grammar/Punctuation</b> <b>Adding the suffix ly to form adverbs</b> We have already learned that adverbs describe a verb and the ones ending in ‘ly’ are the ones we have been concentrating on (E.g. The boy looked <b>sadly</b> around the room for his missing toy.) Print off the ‘ly word search’ activity sheet (See the blog) and find all the adverbs ending in ‘ly’. <b>Challenge</b> – Can you put some of the adverbs ending in ly you have found into interesting sentences?</p>
English	<p><b>Mossop’s Last Chance</b> <b>L.O. To describe a character</b></p> <p>Look carefully at the images of Mossop (See the blog). Today you are going to describe what he looks like (his appearance) and also his personality (his thoughts, feelings and actions). You are going to use your work from yesterday to help you. Write the date and learning objective at the top of your page. Write the sub-heading ‘<b>Appearance</b>’ and describe what Mossop looks like. <b>Remember</b> to run on your sentences, try to use adjectives to add interest to your description and <b>don’t</b> begin every sentence with ‘Mossop’. E.g. The <b>farmyard cat</b> wore a <b>black</b> eye-patch because he was blind in one eye.</p> <p>When you have described Mossop’s appearance, then write the sub-heading ‘<b>Personality</b>’ and write about what kind of character he was. It is always good to say how you know these things about your character by using the reason conjunction ‘because’. E.g. The <b>stripy</b> cat was sad when he had to say goodbye to his friends because he had tears in his eyes.</p>

Topic - Geography	<p><b>L.O To recognise the Equator and North and South Poles</b>  Previously we have revised the seven continents and five oceans of the world. Can you name them?  Today we are going to learn about the Equator, hemispheres and North and South Poles. In your pink book write the date and the learning objective. Write a sub-heading <b>Equator</b> and write sentences about what you have learnt about the Equator. Do the same for <b>Northern Hemisphere, Southern Hemisphere, North Pole and South Pole</b>. Can you add any extra information about each of these divisions of Earth? (Which countries might be in the Southern or Northern hemispheres? Which countries does the Equator go through? Which animals might live at the North or South Poles?). <b>Remember</b> to run on your sentences and don't forget your punctuation.</p>
